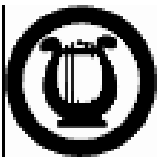
2. Explain what orienteering is.

d) Show a topographic map of your area with magnetic north-south lines.
e) Show how to measure distances on a map using an orienteering compass
f) Show how to measure distances, using a scale on an orienteering compass.
5. Set up a 100m pace course. Determine your waling and running pace for 100 meters. Tell why it is important to pace-count.
